

Fundación Occident announces the winners of the Jesús Serra Degree Scholarships for young people without university references

- Ten girls and two boys, who will study at nine Spanish universities, have been selected for their academic trajectory from among over 100 applications.
- The scholarships, which are aimed at young people who will become the first in their family to attend
 university or the first women in their family to pursue a STEM degree, cover the cost of the degree and
 offer a mentoring and training programme to develop cross-cutting skills.
- With this initiative, Fundación Occident reinforces its commitment to quality education and equal
 opportunities, supporting talented young people in completing their studies and building their
 professional future.

Access to university is strongly influenced by family origin. Young people whose parents have not completed higher education face barriers, often invisible, that make it difficult to obtain a university degree or a good job upon completion of their studies. This is evidenced by the latest data from the OECD's Education at a Glance 2024 report, which establishes that only 19% of these young people complete university education, compared to 72% of the children of graduates. In Spain, this gap has consequences that transcend the academic stage: the average salaries of people with a university degree are between 55% and 85% higher than those of people with only secondary education (Encuesta de Población Activa, 2023).

Mindful of this reality, Fundación Occident has announced today the names of the beneficiaries of the second edition of its <u>Jesús Serra Degree Scholarships</u>. For the second year in a row, the **Foundation has awarded 12 scholarships** aimed at young people who will be the first in their family to overcome all barriers and access university education or who will become the first women in their family to study a degree in the STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics) field.

In this second edition, **ten girls and two boys** from nine autonomous communities (Andalusia, Aragon, Canary Islands, Castilla y Leon, Catalonia, Madrid, Murcia, Navarre and Valencia) have been selected. These 12 young people will begin their university path this 2025/2026 academic year, studying degrees as diverse as medicine, classical philology or aeronautical engineering at 10 universities in the provinces of Alicante, Bilbao, Las Palmas, Madrid, Salamanca, Seville, Tarragona, Valencia and Zaragoza.

"By means of these scholarships, we want to ensure that talent and effort carry more weight in the future of each of our students than any socioeconomic barrier. This is why we are proud to support these young people as they move on to university, offering them the tools required to develop their full potential", says Laura Halpern, President of Fundación Occident.

Fundación The beneficiaries of the 2025 Jesús Serra Degree Scholarships are young people who have successfully completed their Baccalaureate or Advanced Vocational Training studies, but who have few university references in their immediate circle. In this second edition, **the number of applications received has increased**—specifically by 21.2% compared to last year—, and the candidates had an average grade of 8.67. Furthermore, **all the autonomous communities were represented and 73.8% of the total applications were submitted by women**—in access route 1, the first generation of university students, where both men and women could apply, 67.5% of the applications were from women—.

The new scholarship holders join the 12 selected in the first edition, shaping a community that grows and consolidates itself with each call and to which Occident Foundation will provide throughout their university journey with academic, personal and professional support aimed at fostering the development of their talent and their future employability.

"We believe that all the candidates have proven to be exceptional young people committed to their future, and now it is time to support the selected young people as far as they want to go. These scholarships are a springboard to achieving their academic and professional goals", stated Beatriz Sigüenza, Director of Fundación Balia and member of the Jesús Serra Degree Scholarships evaluation committee.

The selection process includes academic excellence criteria that are weighted according to each applicant's financial income threshold, thus favouring students with fewer resources. The final decision is up to a **committee of professionals from the educational and social spheres that review each application** and include in the selection result their evaluation of the presentation videos and letters of recommendation submitted by the students.

The **award ceremony of this 2nd edition of the Jesús Serra Degree Scholarships** will be held on 3 October, when 12 young people will collect the diplomas certifying them as 2025 Jesús Serra scholarship holders. The session will be moderated by journalist and host **Marina Ribel**, and **Jaume Ripoll**, co-founder of FILMIN, will also be present during the event.

Support for students that goes beyond the financial realm

The aim of the Jesús Serra Degree Scholarships is to provide young people with the necessary tools to complete their studies and, when the time comes, enter the job market. Therefore, in addition to financial support—they

Fundación cover the tuition fee, include specific amounts for complementary training and teaching materials and offer a supplement linked to the family residence and income—this programme helps students acquire key skills to face the challenges of university life and build their first network of professional contacts.

One of these benefits is the **personalised mentoring programme**, which pairs each student with a professional in their field of study, and it has become the most valued by the scholarship holders. These mentors provide support to the scholarship holders throughout their university years, helping them improve their academic performance and advising them on various job and training opportunities.

The Jesús Serra Degree Scholarships also include a **training programme** with online and face-to-face sessions that focus on developing skills such as leadership, teamwork and communication. The next face-to-face session will take place on 3 and 4 October in Madrid, coinciding with the award ceremony of the scholarships' second edition. At this event, the 24 scholarship holders—12 from the first edition and 12 from the current one—will participate in practical workshops and activities designed to reinforce their academic and professional skills.
